(b) For an individual in the chemical dependency <u>or corrections</u> field who was disqualified for a crime or conduct listed under section 245C.15, subdivision 1, and whose disqualification was set aside prior to July 1, 2005, the commissioner must consider granting a variance pursuant to section 245C.30 for the license holder for a program dealing primarily with adults. A request for reconsideration evaluated under this paragraph must include a letter of recommendation from the license holder that was subject to the prior set-aside decision addressing the individual's quality of care to children or vulnerable adults and the circumstances of the individual's departure from that service.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective July 1, 2008.

- Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2007 Supplement, section 256.01, subdivision 2, is amended to read:
- Subd. 2. **Specific powers.** Subject to the provisions of section 241.021, subdivision 2, the commissioner of human services shall carry out the specific duties in paragraphs (a) through (cc):
- (a) Administer and supervise all forms of public assistance provided for by state law and other welfare activities or services as are vested in the commissioner. Administration and supervision of human services activities or services includes, but is not limited to, assuring timely and accurate distribution of benefits, completeness of service, and quality program management. In addition to administering and supervising human services activities vested by law in the department, the commissioner shall have the authority to:
- (1) require county agency participation in training and technical assistance programs to promote compliance with statutes, rules, federal laws, regulations, and policies governing human services;
- (2) monitor, on an ongoing basis, the performance of county agencies in the operation and administration of human services, enforce compliance with statutes, rules, federal laws, regulations, and policies governing welfare services and promote excellence of administration and program operation;
- (3) develop a quality control program or other monitoring program to review county performance and accuracy of benefit determinations;
- (4) require county agencies to make an adjustment to the public assistance benefits issued to any individual consistent with federal law and regulation and state law and rule and to issue or recover benefits as appropriate;

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- (5) delay or deny payment of all or part of the state and federal share of benefits and administrative reimbursement according to the procedures set forth in section 256.017;
- (6) make contracts with and grants to public and private agencies and organizations, both profit and nonprofit, and individuals, using appropriated funds; and
- (7) enter into contractual agreements with federally recognized Indian tribes with a reservation in Minnesota to the extent necessary for the tribe to operate a federally approved family assistance program or any other program under the supervision of the commissioner. The commissioner shall consult with the affected county or counties in the contractual agreement negotiations, if the county or counties wish to be included, in order to avoid the duplication of county and tribal assistance program services. The commissioner may establish necessary accounts for the purposes of receiving and disbursing funds as necessary for the operation of the programs.
- (b) Inform county agencies, on a timely basis, of changes in statute, rule, federal law, regulation, and policy necessary to county agency administration of the programs.
- (c) Administer and supervise all child welfare activities; promote the enforcement of laws protecting disabled, dependent, neglected and delinquent children, and children born to mothers who were not married to the children's fathers at the times of the conception nor at the births of the children; license and supervise child-caring and child-placing agencies and institutions; supervise the care of children in boarding and foster homes or in private institutions; and generally perform all functions relating to the field of child welfare now vested in the State Board of Control.
- (d) Administer and supervise all noninstitutional service to disabled persons, including those who are visually impaired, hearing impaired, or physically impaired or otherwise disabled. The commissioner may provide and contract for the care and treatment of qualified indigent children in facilities other than those located and available at state hospitals when it is not feasible to provide the service in state hospitals.
- (e) Assist and actively cooperate with other departments, agencies and institutions, local, state, and federal, by performing services in conformity with the purposes of Laws 1939, chapter 431.
- (f) Act as the agent of and cooperate with the federal government in matters of mutual concern relative to and in conformity with the provisions of Laws 1939, chapter 431, including the administration of any federal funds granted to the state to aid in the performance of any functions of the commissioner as specified in Laws 1939, chapter 431, and including the promulgation of rules making uniformly available medical care benefits to all recipients of public assistance, at such times as the federal government increases its

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participation in assistance expenditures for medical care to recipients of public assistance, the cost thereof to be borne in the same proportion as are grants of aid to said recipients.

- (g) Establish and maintain any administrative units reasonably necessary for the performance of administrative functions common to all divisions of the department.
- (h) Act as designated guardian of both the estate and the person of all the wards of the state of Minnesota, whether by operation of law or by an order of court, without any further act or proceeding whatever, except as to persons committed as developmentally disabled. For children under the guardianship of the commissioner or a tribe in Minnesota recognized by the Secretary of the Interior whose interests would be best served by adoptive placement, the commissioner may contract with a licensed child-placing agency or a Minnesota tribal social services agency to provide adoption services. A contract with a licensed child-placing agency must be designed to supplement existing county efforts and may not replace existing county programs or tribal social services, unless the replacement is agreed to by the county board and the appropriate exclusive bargaining representative, tribal governing body, or the commissioner has evidence that child placements of the county continue to be substantially below that of other counties. Funds encumbered and obligated under an agreement for a specific child shall remain available until the terms of the agreement are fulfilled or the agreement is terminated.
- (i) Act as coordinating referral and informational center on requests for service for newly arrived immigrants coming to Minnesota.
- (j) The specific enumeration of powers and duties as hereinabove set forth shall in no way be construed to be a limitation upon the general transfer of powers herein contained.
- (k) Establish county, regional, or statewide schedules of maximum fees and charges which may be paid by county agencies for medical, dental, surgical, hospital, nursing and nursing home care and medicine and medical supplies under all programs of medical care provided by the state and for congregate living care under the income maintenance programs.
- (l) Have the authority to conduct and administer experimental projects to test methods and procedures of administering assistance and services to recipients or potential recipients of public welfare. To carry out such experimental projects, it is further provided that the commissioner of human services is authorized to waive the enforcement of existing specific statutory program requirements, rules, and standards in one or more counties. The order establishing the waiver shall provide alternative methods and procedures of administration, shall not be in conflict with the basic purposes, coverage, or benefits provided by law, and in no event shall the duration of a project exceed four years. It is further provided that no order establishing an experimental project as authorized by

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the provisions of this section shall become effective until the following conditions have been met:

- (1) the secretary of health and human services of the United States has agreed, for the same project, to waive state plan requirements relative to statewide uniformity; and
- (2) a comprehensive plan, including estimated project costs, shall be approved by the Legislative Advisory Commission and filed with the commissioner of administration.
- (m) According to federal requirements, establish procedures to be followed by local welfare boards in creating citizen advisory committees, including procedures for selection of committee members.
- (n) Allocate federal fiscal disallowances or sanctions which are based on quality control error rates for the aid to families with dependent children program formerly codified in sections 256.72 to 256.87, medical assistance, or food stamp program in the following manner:
- (1) one-half of the total amount of the disallowance shall be borne by the county boards responsible for administering the programs. For the medical assistance and the AFDC program formerly codified in sections 256.72 to 256.87, disallowances shall be shared by each county board in the same proportion as that county's expenditures for the sanctioned program are to the total of all counties' expenditures for the AFDC program formerly codified in sections 256.72 to 256.87, and medical assistance programs. For the food stamp program, sanctions shall be shared by each county board, with 50 percent of the sanction being distributed to each county in the same proportion as that county's administrative costs for food stamps are to the total of all food stamp administrative costs for all counties, and 50 percent of the sanctions being distributed to each county in the same proportion as that county's value of food stamp benefits issued are to the total of all benefits issued for all counties. Each county shall pay its share of the disallowance to the state of Minnesota. When a county fails to pay the amount due hereunder, the commissioner may deduct the amount from reimbursement otherwise due the county, or the attorney general, upon the request of the commissioner, may institute civil action to recover the amount due; and
- (2) notwithstanding the provisions of clause (1), if the disallowance results from knowing noncompliance by one or more counties with a specific program instruction, and that knowing noncompliance is a matter of official county board record, the commissioner may require payment or recover from the county or counties, in the manner prescribed in clause (1), an amount equal to the portion of the total disallowance which resulted from the noncompliance, and may distribute the balance of the disallowance according to clause (1).

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- (o) Develop and implement special projects that maximize reimbursements and result in the recovery of money to the state. For the purpose of recovering state money, the commissioner may enter into contracts with third parties. Any recoveries that result from projects or contracts entered into under this paragraph shall be deposited in the state treasury and credited to a special account until the balance in the account reaches \$1,000,000. When the balance in the account exceeds \$1,000,000, the excess shall be transferred and credited to the general fund. All money in the account is appropriated to the commissioner for the purposes of this paragraph.
- (p) Have the authority to make direct payments to facilities providing shelter to women and their children according to section 256D.05, subdivision 3. Upon the written request of a shelter facility that has been denied payments under section 256D.05, subdivision 3, the commissioner shall review all relevant evidence and make a determination within 30 days of the request for review regarding issuance of direct payments to the shelter facility. Failure to act within 30 days shall be considered a determination not to issue direct payments.
- (q) Have the authority to establish and enforce the following county reporting requirements:
- (1) the commissioner shall establish fiscal and statistical reporting requirements necessary to account for the expenditure of funds allocated to counties for human services programs. When establishing financial and statistical reporting requirements, the commissioner shall evaluate all reports, in consultation with the counties, to determine if the reports can be simplified or the number of reports can be reduced;
- (2) the county board shall submit monthly or quarterly reports to the department as required by the commissioner. Monthly reports are due no later than 15 working days after the end of the month. Quarterly reports are due no later than 30 calendar days after the end of the quarter, unless the commissioner determines that the deadline must be shortened to 20 calendar days to avoid jeopardizing compliance with federal deadlines or risking a loss of federal funding. Only reports that are complete, legible, and in the required format shall be accepted by the commissioner;
- (3) if the required reports are not received by the deadlines established in clause (2), the commissioner may delay payments and withhold funds from the county board until the next reporting period. When the report is needed to account for the use of federal funds and the late report results in a reduction in federal funding, the commissioner shall withhold from the county boards with late reports an amount equal to the reduction in federal funding until full federal funding is received;

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- (4) a county board that submits reports that are late, illegible, incomplete, or not in the required format for two out of three consecutive reporting periods is considered noncompliant. When a county board is found to be noncompliant, the commissioner shall notify the county board of the reason the county board is considered noncompliant and request that the county board develop a corrective action plan stating how the county board plans to correct the problem. The corrective action plan must be submitted to the commissioner within 45 days after the date the county board received notice of noncompliance;
- (5) the final deadline for fiscal reports or amendments to fiscal reports is one year after the date the report was originally due. If the commissioner does not receive a report by the final deadline, the county board forfeits the funding associated with the report for that reporting period and the county board must repay any funds associated with the report received for that reporting period;
- (6) the commissioner may not delay payments, withhold funds, or require repayment under clause (3) or (5) if the county demonstrates that the commissioner failed to provide appropriate forms, guidelines, and technical assistance to enable the county to comply with the requirements. If the county board disagrees with an action taken by the commissioner under clause (3) or (5), the county board may appeal the action according to sections 14.57 to 14.69; and
- (7) counties subject to withholding of funds under clause (3) or forfeiture or repayment of funds under clause (5) shall not reduce or withhold benefits or services to clients to cover costs incurred due to actions taken by the commissioner under clause (3) or (5).
- (r) Allocate federal fiscal disallowances or sanctions for audit exceptions when federal fiscal disallowances or sanctions are based on a statewide random sample for the foster care program under title IV-E of the Social Security Act, United States Code, title 42, in direct proportion to each county's title IV-E foster care maintenance claim for that period.
- (s) Be responsible for ensuring the detection, prevention, investigation, and resolution of fraudulent activities or behavior by applicants, recipients, and other participants in the human services programs administered by the department.
- (t) Require county agencies to identify overpayments, establish claims, and utilize all available and cost-beneficial methodologies to collect and recover these overpayments in the human services programs administered by the department.
- (u) Have the authority to administer a drug rebate program for drugs purchased pursuant to the prescription drug program established under section 256.955 after the

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- beneficiary's satisfaction of any deductible established in the program. The commissioner shall require a rebate agreement from all manufacturers of covered drugs as defined in section 256B.0625, subdivision 13. Rebate agreements for prescription drugs delivered on or after July 1, 2002, must include rebates for individuals covered under the prescription drug program who are under 65 years of age. For each drug, the amount of the rebate shall be equal to the rebate as defined for purposes of the federal rebate program in United States Code, title 42, section 1396r-8. The manufacturers must provide full payment within 30 days of receipt of the state invoice for the rebate within the terms and conditions used for the federal rebate program established pursuant to section 1927 of title XIX of the Social Security Act. The manufacturers must provide the commissioner with any information necessary to verify the rebate determined per drug. The rebate program shall utilize the terms and conditions used for the federal rebate program established pursuant to section 1927 of title XIX of the Social Security Act.
- (v) Have the authority to administer the federal drug rebate program for drugs purchased under the medical assistance program as allowed by section 1927 of title XIX of the Social Security Act and according to the terms and conditions of section 1927. Rebates shall be collected for all drugs that have been dispensed or administered in an outpatient setting and that are from manufacturers who have signed a rebate agreement with the United States Department of Health and Human Services.
- (w) Have the authority to administer a supplemental drug rebate program for drugs purchased under the medical assistance program. The commissioner may enter into supplemental rebate contracts with pharmaceutical manufacturers and may require prior authorization for drugs that are from manufacturers that have not signed a supplemental rebate contract. Prior authorization of drugs shall be subject to the provisions of section 256B.0625, subdivision 13.
- (x) Operate the department's communication systems account established in Laws 1993, First Special Session chapter 1, article 1, section 2, subdivision 2, to manage shared communication costs necessary for the operation of the programs the commissioner supervises. A communications account may also be established for each regional treatment center which operates communications systems. Each account must be used to manage shared communication costs necessary for the operations of the programs the commissioner supervises. The commissioner may distribute the costs of operating and maintaining communication systems to participants in a manner that reflects actual usage. Costs may include acquisition, licensing, insurance, maintenance, repair, staff time and other costs as determined by the commissioner. Nonprofit organizations and state, county, and local government agencies involved in the operation of programs the commissioner

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supervises may participate in the use of the department's communications technology and share in the cost of operation. The commissioner may accept on behalf of the state any gift, bequest, devise or personal property of any kind, or money tendered to the state for any lawful purpose pertaining to the communication activities of the department. Any money received for this purpose must be deposited in the department's communication systems accounts. Money collected by the commissioner for the use of communication systems must be deposited in the state communication systems account and is appropriated to the commissioner for purposes of this section.

- (y) Receive any federal matching money that is made available through the medical assistance program for the consumer satisfaction survey. Any federal money received for the survey is appropriated to the commissioner for this purpose. The commissioner may expend the federal money received for the consumer satisfaction survey in either year of the biennium.
- (z) Designate community information and referral call centers and incorporate cost reimbursement claims from the designated community information and referral call centers into the federal cost reimbursement claiming processes of the department according to federal law, rule, and regulations. Existing information and referral centers provided by Greater Twin Cities United Way or existing call centers for which Greater Twin Cities United Way has legal authority to represent, shall be included in these designations upon review by the commissioner and assurance that these services are accredited and in compliance with national standards. Any reimbursement is appropriated to the commissioner and all designated information and referral centers shall receive payments according to normal department schedules established by the commissioner upon final approval of allocation methodologies from the United States Department of Health and Human Services Division of Cost Allocation or other appropriate authorities.
- (aa) Develop recommended standards for foster care homes that address the components of specialized therapeutic services to be provided by foster care homes with those services.
- (bb) Authorize the method of payment to or from the department as part of the human services programs administered by the department. This authorization includes the receipt or disbursement of funds held by the department in a fiduciary capacity as part of the human services programs administered by the department.
- (cc) Have the authority to administer a drug rebate program for drugs purchased for persons eligible for general assistance medical care under section 256D.03, subdivision 3. For manufacturers that agree to participate in the general assistance medical care rebate program, the commissioner shall enter into a rebate agreement for covered drugs as

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defined in section 256B.0625, subdivisions 13 and 13d. For each drug, the amount of the rebate shall be equal to the rebate as defined for purposes of the federal rebate program in United States Code, title 42, section 1396r-8. The manufacturers must provide payment within the terms and conditions used for the federal rebate program established under section 1927 of title XIX of the Social Security Act. The rebate program shall utilize the terms and conditions used for the federal rebate program established under section 1927 of title XIX of the Social Security Act.

Effective January 1, 2006, drug coverage under general assistance medical care shall be limited to those prescription drugs that:

- (1) are covered under the medical assistance program as described in section 256B.0625, subdivisions 13 and 13d; and
- (2) are provided by manufacturers that have fully executed general assistance medical care rebate agreements with the commissioner and comply with such agreements. Prescription drug coverage under general assistance medical care shall conform to coverage under the medical assistance program according to section 256B.0625, subdivisions 13 to 13g.

The rebate revenues collected under the drug rebate program are deposited in the general fund.

Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2006, section 256J.425, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **Eligibility.** (a) To be eligible for a hardship extension, a participant in an assistance unit subject to the time limit under section 256J.42, subdivision 1, must be in compliance in the participant's 60th counted month. For purposes of determining eligibility for a hardship extension, a participant is in compliance in any month that the participant has not been sanctioned. <u>In order to maintain eligibility for any of the hardship extension categories a participant shall develop and comply with either an employment plan or a family stabilization services plan, whichever is appropriate.</u>

- (b) If one participant in a two-parent assistance unit is determined to be ineligible for a hardship extension, the county shall give the assistance unit the option of disqualifying the ineligible participant from MFIP. In that case, the assistance unit shall be treated as a one-parent assistance unit and the assistance unit's MFIP grant shall be calculated using the shared household standard under section 256J.08, subdivision 82a.
- (c) Prior to denying an extension, the county must review the sanction status and determine whether the sanction is appropriate or if good cause exists under section 256J.57. If the sanction was inappropriately applied or the participant is granted a good cause exception before the end of month 60, the participant shall be considered for an extension.

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- Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2007 Supplement, section 256J.626, subdivision 3, is amended to read:
- Subd. 3. **Eligibility for services.** Families with a minor child, a pregnant woman, or a noncustodial parent of a minor child receiving assistance, with incomes below 200 percent of the federal poverty guideline for a family of the applicable size, are eligible for services funded under the consolidated fund. Counties and tribes must give priority to families currently receiving MFIP, the diversionary work program, or family stabilization services, and families at risk of receiving MFIP or diversionary work program. A county or tribe shall not impose a residency requirement on families, except for the residency requirement under section 256J.12.
- Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2007 Supplement, section 256J.626, subdivision 7, is amended to read:
 - Subd. 7. **Performance base funds.** (a) Beginning For calendar year 2008 2009 and yearly thereafter, each county and tribe will be allocated 95 percent of their initial calendar year allocation. Counties and tribes will be allocated additional funds based on performance as follows:
 - (1) for calendar year 2008 and yearly thereafter, a county or tribe that achieves a 50 percent MFIP TANF participation rate or a five percentage point improvement over the previous year's MFIP TANF participation rate under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (7), as averaged across the four quarterly measurements 12 consecutive months for the most recent year for which the measurements are available, will receive an additional allocation equal to 2.5 percent of its initial allocation; and
 - (2) for calendar years 2005 and thereafter, a county or tribe that performs above the top of its annualized range of expected performance on the three-year self-support index under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (6), will receive an additional allocation equal to five percent of its initial allocation; and
 - (3) for calendar years 2005 and thereafter, a county or tribe that performs within <u>or above</u> its range of expected performance on the annualized three-year self-support index under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (6), will receive an additional allocation equal to 2.5 percent of its initial allocation; and
 - (4) for calendar years 2008 and thereafter, (3) a county or tribe that does not achieve a 50 percent MFIP TANF participation rate or a five percentage point improvement over the previous year's MFIP TANF participation rate under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (7), as averaged across the four quarterly measurements 12 consecutive months for the most recent year for which the measurements are available, will not receive

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an additional 2.5 percent of its initial allocation until after negotiating a multiyear improvement plan with the commissioner; or

- (5) for calendar years 2008 and thereafter, (4) a county or tribe that does not perform within or above its range of expected performance on the annualized three-year self-support index under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (6), will not receive an additional allocation equal to 2.5 percent of its initial allocation until after negotiating a multiyear improvement plan with the commissioner.
- (b) For calendar year 2009 and yearly thereafter, performance-based funds for a federally approved tribal TANF program in which the state and tribe have in place a contract under section 256.01, addressing consolidated funding, will be allocated as follows:
- (1) for calendar year 2006 and yearly thereafter, a tribe that achieves the participation rate approved in its federal TANF plan using the average of four quarterly measurements

 12 consecutive months for the most recent year for which the measurements are available, will receive an additional allocation equal to 2.5 percent of its initial allocation; and
- (2) for calendar years 2006 and thereafter, a tribe that performs above the top of its annualized range of expected performance on the three-year self-support index under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (6), will receive an additional allocation equal to five percent of its initial allocation; or
- (3) for calendar years 2006 and thereafter, a tribe that performs within <u>or above</u> its range of expected performance on the annualized three-year self-support index under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (6), will receive an additional allocation equal to 2.5 percent of its initial allocation; or
- (4) for calendar year 2008 and yearly thereafter, (3) a tribe that does not achieve the participation rate approved in its federal TANF plan using the average of four quarterly measurements 12 consecutive months for the most recent year for which the measurements are available, will not receive an additional allocation equal to 2.5 percent of its initial allocation until after negotiating a multiyear improvement plan with the commissioner; or
- (5) for calendar year 2008 and yearly thereafter, (4) a tribe that does not perform within or above its range of expected performance on the annualized three-year self-support index under section 256J.751, subdivision 2, clause (6), will not receive an additional allocation equal to 2.5 percent until after negotiating a multiyear improvement plan with the commissioner.
- (c) Funds remaining unallocated after the performance-based allocations in paragraph (a) are available to the commissioner for innovation projects under subdivision 5.

- (d) (1) If available funds are insufficient to meet county and tribal allocations under paragraph (a), the commissioner may make available for allocation funds that are unobligated and available from the innovation projects through the end of the current biennium.
- (2) If after the application of clause (1) funds remain insufficient to meet county and tribal allocations under paragraph (a), the commissioner must proportionally reduce the allocation of each county and tribe with respect to their maximum allocation available under paragraph (a).

A family's monthly co-payment fee is the fixed percentage established for the income range multiplied by the highest possible income within that income range.

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Subd. 2. **Parent fee.** A family must be assessed a parent fee for each service period. A family's parent fee must be a fixed percentage of its annual gross income. Parent fees must apply to families eligible for child care assistance under sections 119B.03 and 119B.05. Income must be as defined in section 119B.011, subdivision 15. The fixed percent is based on the relationship of the family's annual gross income to 100 percent of the annual federal poverty guidelines state median income. Parent fees must begin at 75 percent of the poverty level. The minimum parent fees for families between 75 percent and 100 percent of poverty level must be \$5 per month. Parent fees must provide for graduated movement to full payment. Payment of part or all of a family's parent fee directly to the family's child care provider on behalf of the family by a source other than the family shall not affect the family's eligibility for child care assistance, and the amount paid shall be excluded from the family's income. Child care providers who accept third-party payments must maintain family specific documentation of payment source, amount, and time period covered by the payment.

If a provider sends a child home early due to a medical reason, including, but not limited to, fever or contagious illness, the child care center director or lead teacher may verify the illness in lieu of a medical practitioner. If a child attends for part of the time authorized to be in care in a day, but is absent for part of the time authorized to be in care in that same day, the absent time will be reimbursed but the time will not count toward the ten consecutive or 25 cumulative absent day limits. Children in families where at least one parent is under the age of 21, does not have a high school or general equivalency diploma, and is a student in a school district or another similar program that provides or arranges for child care, as well as parenting, social services, career and employment supports, and academic support to achieve high school graduation, may be exempt from the absent day limits upon request of the program

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and approval of the county. If a child attends part of an authorized day, payment to the provider must be for the full amount of care authorized for that day. Child care providers may only be reimbursed for absent days if the provider has a written policy for child absences and charges all other families in care for similar absences.

- (b) Child care providers must be reimbursed for up to ten federal or state holidays or designated holidays per year when the provider charges all families for these days and the holiday or designated holiday falls on a day when the child is authorized to be in attendance. Parents may substitute other cultural or religious holidays for the ten recognized state and federal holidays. Holidays do not count toward the ten consecutive or 25 cumulative absent day limits.
- (c) A family or child care provider may not be assessed an overpayment for an absent day payment unless (1) there was an error in the amount of care authorized for the family, (2) all of the allowed full-day absent payments for the child have been paid, or (3) the family or provider did not timely report a change as required under law.
- (d) The provider and family must receive notification of the number of absent days used upon initial provider authorization for a family and when the family has used 15 cumulative absent days. Background study results must be filed with the adoption petition according to section 259.22, except in an adult adoption where an adoption study and background study are not needed.

In a direct adoptive placement, the child's social and medical history must be filed with the court with the motion for temporary preadoptive custody.

18.21	T. "Relative" means someone who is related to the child as a parent, step-parent,
18.22	sibling by half or whole blood or by adoption, grandparent, aunt, uncle, or first cousin or a
18.23	non-relative with such significant ties to the child that they may be regarded as relatives as
18.24	determined by the court in the sending state.
18.25	U. "Residential Facility" means a facility providing a level of care that is sufficient
18.26	to substitute for parental responsibility or foster care, and is beyond what is needed for
18.27	assessment or treatment of an acute condition. For purposes of the compact, residential
18.28	facilities do not include institutions primarily educational in character, hospitals, or other
18.29	medical facilities.
18.30	V. "Rule" means a written directive, mandate, standard, or principle issued by the
18.31	Interstate Commission promulgated pursuant to Article XI of this compact that is of
18.32	general applicability and that implements, interprets, or prescribes a policy or provision of
18.33	the compact. Rule has the force and effect of an administrative rule in a member state, and
18.33 18.34	the compact. Rule has the force and effect of an administrative rule in a member state, and includes the amendment, repeal, or suspension of an existing rule.

49.1	X. "Service member's permanent duty station" means the military installation where
49.2	an active duty Armed Services member is currently assigned and is physically located
49.3	under competent orders that do not specify the duty as temporary.
49.4	Y. "Service member's state of legal residence" means the state in which the active
49.5	duty Armed Services member is considered a resident for tax and voting purposes.
49.6	Z. "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, the
49.7	Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the
49.8	Northern Marianas Islands, and any other territory of the United States.
49.9	AA. "State court" means a judicial body of a state that is vested by law with
49.10	responsibility for adjudicating cases involving abuse, neglect, deprivation, delinquency, or
49.11	status offenses of individuals who have not attained the age of eighteen (18).
49.12	BB. "Supervision" means monitoring provided by the receiving state once a child
49.13	has been placed in a receiving state pursuant to this compact.
49.14	ARTICLE III. APPLICABILITY
49.15	A. Except as otherwise provided in Article III, Section B, this compact shall apply to:
49.16	1. The interstate placement of a child subject to ongoing court jurisdiction in the
49.17	sending state, due to allegations or findings that the child has been abused, neglected, or
49.18	deprived as defined by the laws of the sending state, provided, however, that the placement
49.19	of such a child into a residential facility shall only require notice of residential placement
49.20	to the receiving state prior to placement.
49.21	2. The interstate placement of a child adjudicated delinquent or unmanageable
49.22	based on the laws of the sending state and subject to ongoing court jurisdiction of the
49.23	sending state if:
49.24	a. the child is being placed in a residential facility in another member state and
49.25	is not covered under another compact; or
49.26	b. the child is being placed in another member state and the determination of safety
49.27	and suitability of the placement and services required is not provided through another
49.28	compact.
49.29	3. The interstate placement of any child by a public child-placing agency or private
49.30	child-placing agency as defined in this compact as a preliminary step to a possible
49.31	adoption.
49.32	B. The provisions of this compact shall not apply to:
49.33	1. The interstate placement of a child in a custody proceeding in which a public
49.34	child placing agency is not a party, provided the placement is not intended to effectuate an
49.35	adoption.

50.1	2. The interstate placement of a child with a non-relative in a receiving state by a
50.2	parent with the legal authority to make such a placement provided, however, that the
50.3	placement is not intended to effectuate an adoption.
50.4	3. The interstate placement of a child by one relative with the lawful authority to
50.5	make such a placement directly with a relative in a receiving state.
50.6	4. The placement of a child, not subject to Article III, Section A, into a residential
50.7	facility by his parent.
50.8	5. The placement of a child with a noncustodial parent provided that:
50.9	a. The noncustodial parent proves to the satisfaction of a court in the sending state a
50.10	substantial relationship with the child; and
50.11	b. The court in the sending state makes a written finding that placement with the
50.12	non-custodial parent is in the best interests of the child; and
50.13	c. The court in the sending state dismisses its jurisdiction over the child's case.
50.14	6. A child entering the United States from a foreign country for the purpose of
50.15	adoption or leaving the United States to go to a foreign country for the purpose of
50.16	adoption in that country.
50.17	7. Cases in which a U.S. citizen child living overseas with his family, at least one
50.18	of whom is in the U.S. Armed Services, and who is stationed overseas, is removed and
50.19	placed in a state.
50.20	8. The sending of a child by a public child-placing agency or a private child-placing
50.21	agency for a visit as defined by the rules of the Interstate Commission.
50.22	C. For purposes of determining the applicability of this compact to the placement of
50.23	a child with a family in the Armed Services, the public child-placing agency or private
50.24	child-placing agency may choose the state of the service member's permanent duty station
50.25	or the service member's declared legal residence.
50.26	D. Nothing in this compact shall be construed to prohibit the concurrent application
50.27	of the provisions of this compact with other applicable interstate compacts including the
50.28	Interstate Compact for Juveniles and the Interstate Compact on Adoption and Medical
50.29	Assistance. The Interstate Commission may in cooperation with other interstate compact
50.30	commissions having responsibility for the interstate movement, placement, or transfer of
50.31	children, promulgate like rules to ensure the coordination of services, timely placement
50.32	of children, and the reduction of unnecessary or duplicative administrative or procedural
50.33	requirements.
50.34	ARTICLE IV. JURISDICTION
50.35	A. Except as provided in Article IV, Section G, concerning private and independent
50.36	adoptions and in interstate placements in which the public child placing agency is not a

51.1	party to a custody proceeding, the sending state shall retain jurisdiction over a child with
51.2	respect to all matters of custody and disposition of the child which it would have had if the
51.3	child had remained in the sending state. Such jurisdiction shall also include the power to
51.4	order the return of the child to the sending state.
51.5	B. When an issue of child protection or custody is brought before a court in the
51.6	receiving state, such court shall confer with the court of the sending state to determine the
51.7	most appropriate forum for adjudication.
51.8	C. In accordance with its own laws, the court in the sending state shall have authority
51.9	to terminate its jurisdiction if:
51.10	1. The child is reunified with the parent in the receiving state who is the subject
51.11	of allegations or findings of abuse or neglect, only with the concurrence of the public
51.12	child-placing agency in the receiving state; or
51.13	2. The child is adopted;
51.14	3. The child reaches the age of majority under the laws of the sending state; or
51.15	4. The child achieves legal independence pursuant to the laws of the sending state; or
51.16	5. A guardianship is created by a court in the receiving state with the concurrence of
51.17	the court in the sending state; or
51.18	6. An Indian tribe has petitioned for and received jurisdiction from the court in
51.19	the sending state; or
51.20	7. The public child-placing agency of the sending state requests termination and has
51.21	obtained the concurrence of the public child-placing agency in the receiving the state.
51.22	D. When a sending state court terminates its jurisdiction, the receiving state
51.23	child-placing agency shall be notified.
51.24	E. Nothing in this article shall defeat a claim of jurisdiction by a receiving state
51.25	court sufficient to deal with an act of truancy, delinquency, crime, or behavior involving a
51.26	child as defined by the laws of the receiving state committed by the child in the receiving
51.27	state which would be a violation of its laws.
51.28	F. Nothing in this article shall limit the receiving state's ability to take emergency
51.29	jurisdiction for the protection of the child.
51.30	G. The substantive laws of the state in which an adoption will be finalized shall
51.31	solely govern all issues relating to the adoption of the child and the court in which the
51.32	adoption proceeding is filed shall have subject matter jurisdiction regarding all substantive
51.33	issues relating to the adoption, except:
51.34	1. when the child is a ward of another court that established jurisdiction over the
51.35	child prior to the placement;
51.36	2. when the child is in the legal custody of a public agency in the sending state; or

52.1	3. when the court in the sending state has otherwise appropriately assumed
52.2	jurisdiction over the child, prior to the submission of the request for approval of placement.
52.3	ARTICLE V. PLACEMENT EVALUATION
52.4	A. Prior to sending, bringing, or causing a child to be sent or brought into a receiving
52.5	state, the public child-placing agency shall provide a written request for assessment to
52.6	the receiving state.
52.7	B. For placements by a private child-placing agency, a child may be sent or brought,
52.8	or caused to be sent or brought, into a receiving state, upon receipt and immediate review
52.9	of the required content in a request for approval of a placement in both the sending and
52.10	receiving state public child-placing agency. The required content to accompany a request
52.11	for provisional approval shall include all of the following:
52.12	1. A request for approval identifying the child, birth parents, the prospective adoptive
52.13	parents, and the supervising agency, signed by the person requesting approval; and
52.14	2. The appropriate consents or relinquishments signed by the birthparents in
52.15	accordance with the laws of the sending state or, where permitted, the laws of the state
52.16	where the adoption will be finalized; and
52.17	3. Certification by a licensed attorney or other authorized agent of a private adoption
52.18	agency that the consent or relinquishment is in compliance with the applicable laws of the
52.19	sending state, or where permitted the laws of the state where finalization of the adoption
52.20	will occur; and
52.21	4. A home study; and
52.22	5. An acknowledgment of legal risk signed by the prospective adoptive parents.
52.23	C. The sending state and the receiving state may request additional information or
52.24	documents prior to finalization of an approved placement, but they may not delay travel
52.25	by the prospective adoptive parents with the child if the required content for approval
52.26	has been submitted, received, and reviewed by the public child-placing agency in both
52.27	the sending state and the receiving state.
52.28	D. Approval from the public child-placing agency in the receiving state for a
52.29	provisional or approved placement is required as provided for in the rules of the Interstate
52.30	Commission.
52.31	E. The procedures for making, and the request for an assessment, shall contain all
52.32	information and be in such form as provided for in the rules of the Interstate Commission.
52.33	F. Upon receipt of a request from the public child-placing agency of the sending
52.34	state, the receiving state shall initiate an assessment of the proposed placement to
52.35	determine its safety and suitability. If the proposed placement is a placement with a

53.1	relative, the public child-placing agency of the sending state may request a determination
53.2	for a provisional placement.
53.3	G. The public child-placing agency in the receiving state may request from the
53.4	public child-placing agency or the private child-placing agency in the sending state, and
53.5	shall be entitled to receive supporting or additional information necessary to complete
53.6	the assessment.
53.7	ARTICLE VI. PLACEMENT AUTHORITY
53.8	A. Except as otherwise provided in this compact, no child subject to this compact
53.9	shall be placed into a receiving state until approval for such placement is obtained.
53.10	B. If the public child-placing agency in the receiving state does not approve
53.11	the proposed placement then the child shall not be placed. The receiving state shall
53.12	provide written documentation of any such determination in accordance with the rules
53.13	promulgated by the Interstate Commission. Such determination is not subject to judicial
53.14	review in the sending state.
53.15	C. If the proposed placement is not approved, any interested party shall have
53.16	standing to seek an administrative review of the receiving state's determination.
53.17	1. The administrative review and any further judicial review associated with
53.18	the determination shall be conducted in the receiving state pursuant to its applicable
53.19	administrative procedures.
53.20	2. If a determination not to approve the placement of the child in the receiving state
53.21	is overturned upon review, the placement shall be deemed approved, provided however
53.22	that all administrative or judicial remedies have been exhausted or the time for such
53.23	remedies has passed.
53.24	ARTICLE VII. PLACING AGENCY RESPONSIBILITY
53.25	A. For the interstate placement of a child made by a public child-placing agency
53.26	or state court:
53.27	1. The public child-placing agency in the sending state shall have financial
53.28	responsibility for:
53.29	a. the ongoing support and maintenance for the child during the period of the
53.30	placement, unless otherwise provided for in the receiving state; and
53.31	b. as determined by the public child-placing agency in the sending state, services for
53.32	the child beyond the public services for which the child is eligible in the receiving state.
53.33	2. The receiving state shall only have financial responsibility for:
53.34	a. any assessment conducted by the receiving state; and

54.1	b. supervision conducted by the receiving state at the level necessary to support
54.2	the placement as agreed upon by the public child-placing agencies of the receiving and
54.3	sending state.
54.4	3. Nothing in this provision shall prohibit public child-placing agencies in the
54.5	sending state from entering into agreements with licensed agencies or persons in the
54.6	receiving state to conduct assessments and provide supervision.
54.7	B. For the placement of a child by a private child-placing agency preliminary to a
54.8	possible adoption, the private child-placing agency shall be:
54.9	1. Legally responsible for the child during the period of placement as provided for in
54.10	the law of the sending state until the finalization of the adoption.
54.11	2. Financially responsible for the child absent a contractual agreement to the
54.12	contrary.
54.13	C. The public child-placing agency in the receiving state shall provide timely
54.14	assessments, as provided for in the rules of the Interstate Commission.
54.15	D. The public child-placing agency in the receiving state shall provide, or arrange
54.16	for the provision of, supervision and services for the child, including timely reports,
54.17	during the period of the placement.
54.18	E. Nothing in this compact shall be construed as to limit the authority of the public
54.19	child-placing agency in the receiving state from contracting with a licensed agency or
54.20	person in the receiving state for an assessment or the provision of supervision or services
54.21	for the child or otherwise authorizing the provision of supervision or services by a licensed
54.22	agency during the period of placement.
54.23	F. Each member state shall provide for coordination among its branches of
54.24	government concerning the state's participation in, and compliance with, the compact and
54.25	Interstate Commission activities, through the creation of an advisory council or use of an
54.26	existing body or board.
54.27	G. Each member state shall establish a central state compact office, which shall
54.28	be responsible for state compliance with the compact and the rules of the Interstate
54.29	Commission.
54.30	H. The public child-placing agency in the sending state shall oversee compliance
54.31	with the provisions of the Indian Child Welfare Act (25 USC 1901 et seq.) for placements
54.32	subject to the provisions of this compact, prior to placement.
54.33	I. With the consent of the Interstate Commission, states may enter into limited
54.34	agreements that facilitate the timely assessment and provision of services and supervision
54.35	of placements under this compact.
54.26	ADTICLE VIII INTEDSTATE COMMISSION FOR THE

55.1	PLACEMENT OF CHILDREN
55.2	The member states hereby establish, by way of this compact, a commission known
55.3	as the "Interstate Commission for the Placement of Children." The activities of the
55.4	Interstate Commission are the formation of public policy and are a discretionary state
55.5	function. The Interstate Commission shall:
55.6	A. Be a joint commission of the member states and shall have the responsibilities,
55.7	powers and duties set forth herein, and such additional powers as may be conferred upon it
55.8	by subsequent concurrent action of the respective legislatures of the member states.
55.9	B. Consist of one commissioner from each member state who shall be appointed by
55.10	the executive head of the state human services administration with ultimate responsibility
55.11	for the child welfare program. The appointed commissioner shall have the legal authority
55.12	to vote on policy related matters governed by this compact binding the state.
55.13	1. Each member state represented at a meeting of the Interstate Commission is
55.14	entitled to one vote.
55.15	2. A majority of the member states shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of
55.16	business, unless a larger quorum is required by the bylaws of the Interstate Commission.
55.17	3. A representative shall not delegate a vote to another member state.
55.18	4. A representative may delegate voting authority to another person from their state
55.19	for a specified meeting.
55.20	C. In addition to the commissioners of each member state, the Interstate Commission
55.21	shall include persons who are members of interested organizations as defined in the bylaws
55.22	or rules of the Interstate Commission. Such members shall be ex officio and shall not be
55.23	entitled to vote on any matter before the Interstate Commission.
55.24	D. Establish an executive committee which shall have the authority to administer
55.25	the day-to-day operations and administration of the Interstate Commission. It shall not
55.26	have the power to engage in rulemaking.
55.27	ARTICLE IX. POWERS AND DUTIES OF
55.28	THE INTERSTATE COMMISSION
55.29	The Interstate Commission shall have the following powers:
55.30	A. To promulgate rules and take all necessary actions to effect the goals, purposes
55.31	and obligations as enumerated in this compact.
55.32	B. To provide for dispute resolution among member states.
55.33	C. To issue, upon request of a member state, advisory opinions concerning the
55.34	meaning or interpretation of the interstate compact, its bylaws, rules or actions.
55.35	D. To enforce compliance with this compact or the bylaws or rules of the Interstate
55.36	Commission pursuant to Article XII.

56.1	E. Collect standardized data concerning the interstate placement of children subject
56.2	to this compact as directed through its rules which shall specify the data to be collected,
56.3	the means of collection and data exchange and reporting requirements.
56.4	F. To establish and maintain offices as may be necessary for the transacting of its
56.5	business.
56.6	G. To purchase and maintain insurance and bonds.
56.7	H. To hire or contract for services of personnel or consultants as necessary to
56.8	carry out its functions under the compact and establish personnel qualification policies,
56.9	and rates of compensation.
56.10	I. To establish and appoint committees and officers including, but not limited to, an
56.11	executive committee as required by Article X.
56.12	J. To accept any and all donations and grants of money, equipment, supplies,
56.13	materials, and services, and to receive, utilize, and dispose thereof.
56.14	K. To lease, purchase, accept contributions or donations of, or otherwise to own,
56.15	hold, improve, or use any property, real, personal, or mixed.
56.16	L. To sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange, abandon, or otherwise dispose
56.17	of any property, real, personal, or mixed.
56.18	M. To establish a budget and make expenditures.
56.19	N. To adopt a seal and bylaws governing the management and operation of the
56.20	Interstate Commission.
56.21	O. To report annually to the legislatures, governors, the judiciary, and state advisory
56.22	councils of the member states concerning the activities of the Interstate Commission
56.23	during the preceding year. Such reports shall also include any recommendations that may
56.24	have been adopted by the Interstate Commission.
56.25	P. To coordinate and provide education, training, and public awareness regarding the
56.26	interstate movement of children for officials involved in such activity.
56.27	Q. To maintain books and records in accordance with the bylaws of the Interstate
56.28	<u>Commission.</u>
56.29	R. To perform such functions as may be necessary or appropriate to achieve the
56.30	purposes of this compact.
56.31	ARTICLE X. ORGANIZATION AND OPERATION OF THE
56.32	INTERSTATE COMMISSION
56.33	A. Bylaws
56.34	1. Within 12 months after the first Interstate Commission meeting, the Interstate
56.35	Commission shall adopt bylaws to govern its conduct as may be necessary or appropriate
56.36	to carry out the purposes of the compact.

57.1	2. The Interstate Commission's bylaws and rules shall establish conditions and
57.2	procedures under which the Interstate Commission shall make its information and official
57.3	records available to the public for inspection or copying. The Interstate Commission may
57.4	exempt from disclosure information or official records to the extent they would adversely
57.5	affect personal privacy rights or proprietary interests.
57.6	B. Meetings
57.7	1. The Interstate Commission shall meet at least once each calendar year. The
57.8	chairperson may call additional meetings and, upon the request of a simple majority of the
57.9	member states shall call additional meetings.
57.10	2. Public notice shall be given by the Interstate Commission of all meetings and
57.11	all meetings shall be open to the public, except as set forth in the rules or as otherwise
57.12	provided in the compact. The Interstate Commission and its committees may close a
57.13	meeting, or portion thereof, where it determines by two-thirds vote that an open meeting
57.14	would be likely to:
57.15	a. relate solely to the Interstate Commission's internal personnel practices and
57.16	procedures; or
57.17	b. disclose matters specifically exempted from disclosure by federal law; or
57.18	c. disclose financial or commercial information which is privileged, proprietary or
57.19	confidential in nature; or
57.20	d. involve accusing a person of a crime, or formally censuring a person; or
57.21	e. disclose information of a personal nature where disclosure would constitute
57.22	a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy or physically endanger one or more
57.23	persons; or
57.24	f. disclose investigative records compiled for law enforcement purposes; or
57.25	g. specifically relate to the Interstate Commission's participation in a civil action
57.26	or other legal proceeding.
57.27	3. For a meeting, or portion of a meeting, closed pursuant to this provision, the
57.28	Interstate Commission's legal counsel or designee shall certify that the meeting may be
57.29	closed and shall reference each relevant exemption provision. The Interstate Commission
57.30	shall keep minutes which shall fully and clearly describe all matters discussed in a meeting
57.31	and shall provide a full and accurate summary of actions taken, and the reasons therefore,
57.32	including a description of the views expressed and the record of a roll call vote. All
57.33	documents considered in connection with an action shall be identified in such minutes. All
57.34	minutes and documents of a closed meeting shall remain under seal, subject to release by a

majority vote of the Interstate Commission or by court order.

4. The bylaws may provide for meetings of the Interstate Commission to be conducted by telecommunication or other electronic communication.

C. Officers and Staff

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- 1. The Interstate Commission may, through its executive committee, appoint or retain a staff director for such period, upon such terms and conditions and for such compensation as the Interstate Commission may deem appropriate. The staff director shall serve as secretary to the Interstate Commission, but shall not have a vote. The staff director may hire and supervise such other staff as may be authorized by the Interstate Commission.
- 2. The Interstate Commission shall elect, from among its members, a chairperson and a vice chairperson of the executive committee and other necessary officers, each of whom shall have such authority and duties as may be specified in the bylaws.

D. Qualified Immunity, Defense and Indemnification

- 1. The Interstate Commission's staff director and its employees shall be immune from suit and liability, either personally or in their official capacity, for a claim for damage to or loss of property or personal injury or other civil liability caused or arising out of or relating to an actual or alleged act, error, or omission that occurred, or that such person had a reasonable basis for believing occurred within the scope of Commission employment, duties, or responsibilities; provided, that such person shall not be protected from suit or liability for damage, loss, injury, or liability caused by a criminal act or the intentional or willful and wanton misconduct of such person.
- a. The liability of the Interstate Commission's staff director and employees or Interstate Commission representatives, acting within the scope of such person's employment or duties for acts, errors, or omissions occurring within such person's state may not exceed the limits of liability set forth under the Constitution and laws of that state for state officials, employees, and agents. The Interstate Commission is considered to be an instrumentality of the states for the purposes of any such action. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to protect such person from suit or liability for damage, loss, injury, or liability caused by a criminal act or the intentional or willful and wanton misconduct of such person.
- b. The Interstate Commission shall defend the staff director and its employees and, subject to the approval of the Attorney General or other appropriate legal counsel of the member state shall defend the commissioner of a member state in a civil action seeking to impose liability arising out of an actual or alleged act, error, or omission that occurred within the scope of Interstate Commission employment, duties or responsibilities, or that the defendant had a reasonable basis for believing occurred within the scope of Interstate Commission employment, duties, or responsibilities, provided that the actual or alleged

act, error, or omission did not result from intentional or willful and wanton misconduct on 59.1 59.2 the part of such person. c. To the extent not covered by the state involved, member state, or the Interstate 59.3 Commission, the representatives or employees of the Interstate Commission shall be 59.4 held harmless in the amount of a settlement or judgment, including attorney's fees and 59.5 costs, obtained against such persons arising out of an actual or alleged act, error, or 59.6 omission that occurred within the scope of Interstate Commission employment, duties, or 59.7 responsibilities, or that such persons had a reasonable basis for believing occurred within 59.8 the scope of Interstate Commission employment, duties, or responsibilities, provided that 59.9 the actual or alleged act, error, or omission did not result from intentional or willful and 59.10 wanton misconduct on the part of such persons. 59.11 59.12 ARTICLE XI. RULEMAKING FUNCTIONS OF THE INTERSTATE COMMISSION 59.13 A. The Interstate Commission shall promulgate and publish rules in order to 59.14 59.15 effectively and efficiently achieve the purposes of the compact. B. Rulemaking shall occur pursuant to the criteria set forth in this article and the 59.16 bylaws and rules adopted pursuant thereto. Such rulemaking shall substantially conform 59.17 to the principles of the "Model State Administrative Procedures Act," 1981 Act, Uniform 59.18 Laws Annotated, Vol. 15, p.1 (2000), or such other administrative procedure acts as the 59.19 Interstate Commission deems appropriate consistent with due process requirements under 59.20 the United States Constitution as now or hereafter interpreted by the U. C. When promulgating a rule, the Interstate Commission shall, at a minimum: 59.24 1. Publish the proposed rule's entire text stating the reason(s) for that proposed 59.25 rule; and 59.26 2. Allow and invite any and all persons to submit written data, facts, opinions, 59.27 and arguments, which information shall be added to the record, and be made publicly 59.28 available; and 59.29 3. Promulgate a final rule and its effective date, if appropriate, based on input from 59.30 state or local officials, or interested parties. 59.31 D.
